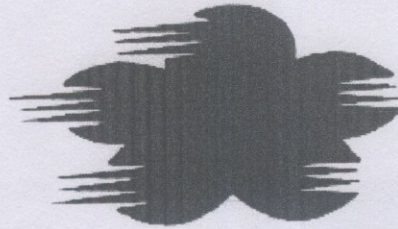

AGREEMENT TO ESTABLISH A THREE-YEAR INTEGRATED MASTER PROGRAM

**Between the
Indiana University
and the
National Taiwan Sport University**

WHEREAS, in accordance with the cooperative agreement between the National Taiwan Sport University, Taoyuan, Taiwan (NTSU) and Indiana University (IU), Bloomington, Indiana, United States of America signed in 2008, we now agree to collaboratively deliver a Master Degree from NTSU in Taiwan and a Master Degree from IU School of Health and Physical Education and Recreation in the United State of America.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, the parties mutually agree to the following general terms and conditions.

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

It is agreed that:

1. IU and NTSU will collaborate to provide NTSU students with a Three-Year Integrated Master Program leading to a Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree from Department of Recreation and Leisure Industry Management at NTSU and a Master of Science (MS) degree from Department of Recreation, Park, and Tourism Studies at IU. The program will be established and implemented no later than the 2008 fall term.
2. Participants in the program will be drawn from the graduate program within the Department of Recreation and Leisure Industry Management at NTSU. Under the Integrated Three-Year Master Program, students in the graduate program at NTSU will enter the Department of Recreation, Park, and Tourism Studies at IU at the beginning of their second year of graduate study and must take the Advanced Research Method and Multivariate Analysis before going to IU. They will be enrolled initially as graduate students taking graduate courses specified in the Integrated Program. While studying at IU, the students will need to complete requirements for the Master Degree program at IU. The students will be enrolled on a voluntary basis as needed in supplemental non-credit English-language classes to further their language proficiency. The English classes could begin during the summer prior to their first full semester at IU.
3. Criteria for admission to the Integrated Program will be based upon admission standards at both NTSU and IU. These criteria will be enforced by NTSU as students apply for admission to the Program. Applicants will also complete IU application for admission. Each applicant must take the TOEFL and score a minimum of 550 (PBT) or 213 (CBT). Exemptions to the minimum qualifications of 550 TOEFL will be addressed on a case-by case basis following recommendations from IU and may necessitate additional English-language classes.
4. NTSU students registering at IU will pay full non-resident graduate tuition and student fees to IU. They will be exempt from paying these fees at NTSU while registered at IU. NTSU students will be eligible to apply for an international student scholarship.
5. NTSU and IU will reach an agreement on the list of transferable courses that can be counted towards graduation without further evaluation before signing the contract. The maximum transferable credits should not exceed fifteen credits. (Please see Appendix A for course listing)
6. Beginning fall term 2009, one student from NTSU will be admitted to the graduate school at IU and continuing each year during the term of this agreement, NTSU will send to IU a group of students not to exceed four students per academic year.
7. Neither IU nor NTSU will be responsible for the cost to students of room, board, travel, or personal expenses including books and insurance. The parties acknowledge that participants will be required to pay these expenses.

8. IU will assist arriving NTSU students to secure suitable housing for the period of time they will be on IU's campus.
9. NTSU students will be required to purchase IU health insurance or provide proof in English of coverage that meets or exceeds that offered by IU.
10. IU will assist NTSU, to the fullest extent possible, in obtaining visas and other documents required by the U.S. government. While attending IU, students will be required to obtain and maintain an appropriate non-resident student visa (F-1 or J-1). In order to comply with U.S. government regulations, students from NTSU will be required to guarantee that they have the financial resources to meet all expenses. After the submission of a satisfactorily completed application, IU will issue documents necessary to secure a visa.
11. All applications for admission from NTSU will need to be received by IU no later than January 1st prior to the date of arrival.
12. The students' work and progress will be monitored by an Advisory Board consisting of faculty members from both NTSU and IU. These faculty members will be responsible for student advising and assessment and will provide assistance to those who may need supplemental instruction in order to succeed in the program of study. The Advisory Board will determine whether individual students need to extend the length of the Three-Year Master Program, based on the student's overall performance.
13. Students enrolled in the MS program at IU will have access to all offices and services of the University, including academic advising offered by the School of Health and Physical Education and Recreation. They will be encouraged to become involved in the events and activities offered by the Leo R. Dowling International Center.
14. NTSU and IU agree to indemnify and hold one another harmless from any and all claims by student participants, their parents, survivors, or agents, arising from any negligent acts or omission on the part of either university or any of their employees. The relationship of NTSU and IU under this agreement shall be that of independent contractors, and a party shall not be deemed, nor hold itself out as being, a partner or agent of the other party. Neither NTSU nor IU shall be liable for acts of the other, nor shall they be liable for the acts of students participating in this program.
15. This agreement will be in effect for a period of five years from the date it is signed. At the end of the five-year period, it will be subjected to a comprehensive evaluation. Depending on the results of the evaluation, this Agreement can be continued without changes; it can be modified; or it can be terminated. Termination would not affect students already engaged in the Three-Year Integrated Master Program.
